Description	This IBA encompasses the large "sky island" mountain range, the Santa Rita mountains, in southeastern Arizona. It spans from near 5000 feet to 9453 feet in elevation at the top of Mount Wrightson, the highest peak in the range and includes the world famous birding hot spot Madera Canyon. The IBA boundary is the National Forest boundary around the mountain. The range has numerous drainages with riparian habitat, but few are perennial, and of those only sections above 6000 feet typically ary ear-round perennial. The distinct forest, oak savannah, grassland, and riparian habitats found here provide essential habitat for significant populations of a number of bird species of conservation concern.		
Mission/Goals	Conservation of a major Madrean occidental sky island that represents a rare/unique habitat mosaic in Arizona, supports populations of breeding, year-round and migratory birds, and provides habitat for state species of concern.
